

(ASAIPSAR)

This Partnership was created last year when the FPC's Asylum Seekers Task Force learned of a group of churches organizing to help Afghans being evacuated en-mass. We joined the group to form the ASAIPSAR. We've since provided food and made deliveries to newly arrived Afghan families, created an ongoing food pantry in Lowell, and aligned with the IINE (International Institute of New England) to support a family of six in Lowell and another in Maynard. We're looking for ways to sustain this Interfaith effort and investigating how to help people in Haiti.

This Week in Religious Education

<u>PreK-1st Grade and 2nd-5th Grade</u>: In this first day of a new trimester, we will explore *decentering* whiteness and *centering* anti-racist, multicultural community through stories, music, and games.
